This program is designed for practicing otolaryngologists with a significant interest in endoscopic surgery and management of sinus and nasal problems. The course is a three or four day one-on-one clinical experience where two participants may spend time with Dr. David Kennedy, Dr. James Palmer and Dr. Alexander Chiu during their office hours, observing them in surgery and performing a cadaveric dissection. It will be of particular benefit to otolaryngologists who have been to didactic courses, developed some experience with FESS and identified specific problem

areas in the surgical management of patients with sinus disease. A maximum of two otolaryngologists is admitted to the mini fellowship at any one time. This allows for a close one-on-one experience with the faculty. Participants are encouraged to present CT scans from their own difficult or interesting patient cases. Mini Fellows are invited to attend our Wednesday evening clinical conferences and Thursday morning Grand Rounds.

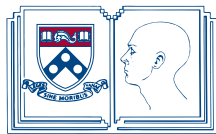

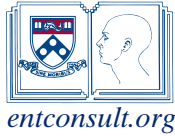

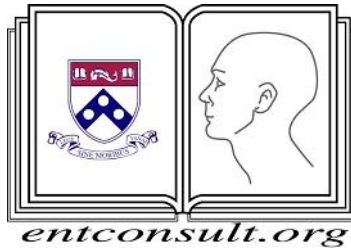

Endoscopic Sinus Surgery Visiting Mini Fellowship

Program Overview:

This program is designed for practicing otolaryngologists with a significant interest in endoscopic surgery and management of sinus and nasal problems. The course is a 3 or 4 day one-on-one clinical experience where participants spend time with Dr. David Kennedy, Dr. James Palmer and Dr. Alexander Chiu observing them in surgery and observing during office hours. Participants also have the opportunity to perform a cadaveric dissection and to obtain experience with computer assisted surgical navigation. The course is of particular benefit to otolaryngologists who have been to didactic courses, developed some experience with FESS and identified specific problem areas in the surgical management of patients with sinus disease. A maximum of two otolaryngologists is admitted to the mini fellowship at any one time. This allows for a close one-on-one experience with the faculty.

The participants' individual aims are identified with the faculty when they arrive during a brief breakfast and orientation. Participants spend the first morning observing Dr. Kennedy during office hours. After lunch participants perform a hand-on cadaveric dissection with Dr. Chiu and the rhinology fellow. On the second day, Drs. Kennedy and Palmer perform surgery in adjoining operating rooms. Participants are encouraged to move freely between operating suites to observe each surgical procedure. Although individual surgeries are subject to cancellation, participants usually have ample opportunity for observation. On the third day, post-op care is administered by Dr. Kennedy and Dr. Palmer. We encourage the Mini Fellows to attend our Wednesday afternoon clinical conferences, which highlight upcoming rhinologic cases of interest. Mini fellows may also bring a couple of CT scans of their own difficult or interesting cases to present and discuss. There is ample time for questions and answers with the faculty. We also invite visiting fellows to attend Thursday morning departmental Grand Rounds. Mini Fellows may observe surgery in the OR on Thursdays, however, this is subject to case availability and OR schedules. During lunch breaks and any free time each day, participants are asked to explore our video library.

Target Audience:

Otolaryngologists in Private or Academic Practice

OBJECTIVES:

Upon completion of the course participants should be able to:

- Describe the complex 3-D anatomy of the paranasal sinuses.
- Identify and assess new technological advances and developments in sinus surgery.
- Discuss management of difficult and severe chronic sinusitis and understand the role of post-op care.
- Perform routine nasal endoscopy for the diagnosis of sino-nasal disease.
- Explain the role and techniques of surgical stereotactic intraoperative navigation
- Describe appropriate handling of endoscopic sinus surgical instruments.

Transportation:

Most visitors arrive into Philadelphia International Airport. From the baggage claim area it is very easy to secure a taxi. It usually takes 15-20 minutes to drive to your hotel in central Philadelphia and the fare is generally \$25.00. Airport Limo/shuttle services are also available. The cost is usually \$15.00 per person and the ride is usually 25-35 minutes. If you would like to arrange for a private limousine or sedan pick-up please contact our office. We will be happy to arrange this for you and notify you of the costs involved.

If you are traveling by train, Amtrak 30th Street Station is generally 5-10 minutes from any of the hotels and taxis are easily accessed from the train station.
