Addressing Racial Inequity In Healthcare

What is it?

A wide body of research has shown that in the US, racial and ethnic minorities are less likely to receive preventive medical treatments than whites and often receive lower-quality care. Further study of this issue has also shown that even after taking into account other factors typically used to explain racial disparities- income, neighborhood, co-occurring illnesses, and health insurance typehealth outcomes among blacks, in particular, were still worse than whites. The causes of these inequities are complex and likely due to a

combination of historical, structural and individual factors.

Why is it important?

All patients, regardless of personal characteristics such as race or ethnicity, deserve access to the best patient and family centered care possible. Addressing racial inequity is critical to helping all patients achieve their best health and quality of life. Additionally, inequities affect our ability to improve the quality of care and increase health care costs for everyone.

What you can do

- Consider your own implicit biases and how they may impact the care you provide.
- **Examine data** in your area to determine if there are inequities. Do you look at outcomes or quality metrics stratified by race or ethnicity?
- Educate yourself and your colleagues. Acknowledging that racial inequities exist in healthcare is the first step toward addressing them.

Together we can ensure our culture and climate are inclusive for everyone.
